

I researched the Gloucester City News and the Courier Post looking for an article about Marian's death and an obituary. The GC News began in 1927 and the Courier Post started in the 1940s.

I did find out that Marian's daughter, Lillian Pollick, died Nov.23,1923. Madeline Andrews had Lillian's death documented on the back of a picture honoring her (Madeline's) late mother, Mary J. Blake Pollick. The picture is the gates to heaven. It says: "Gone But Not Forgotten".

Good Morning Ann,

Sorry it has taken so long to get back to you about the Pollick side of the family. The 1930 census listed Frank Pollick Sr as W.Frank.Could the W have stood for widow? My mother's given name is Madeline Margaret (Stoy) Pollick(Andrews). Madeline and John Andrews never legally adopted her. They nicknamed her "Betty Jane." I don't know what the name or letter after the J could bein the 1930 census. Could it be Stoy? Madeline Andrews wanted to keep my mother's connection to the Stoys. Madeline Andrews said that was why she never changed my mother's name legally. However, my mother went through 12 years of school as Betty Jane Andrews. My mother was raised Catholic, and it was when she was making her wedding plans that she learned the truth. Madeline Andrews was concerned that St. Mary's Church would not call her name out in the wedding bands as Andrews because her baptism records were Pollick. Frank Jr. was brought into the Andrew's home probably around age 7. Neighbors told Madeline Andrews that when Frank Pollick Sr.would leave for work in the morning, FrankJr., have to sit on the baby-sitter's steps until she got up. Madeline and John took Frank Jr. in as Betty Jane's cousin. I don't know why he didn't show up in the 1930 census.??

I don't think the Campbell's in Morris County are related.

Here's what I know about the Blakes and the Pollicks. All oral history.

Mary J. Blake left Portland, Maine for Gloucester City, NJ looking for work. She left Portland with her young daughter, my mother's aunt, Mary J. Blake, Jr. Supposedly mother or daughter was related to the McCanns of Tom McCann Shoes. Mary J. Blake found work at the Wellsback factory in Gloucester City,NJ.She meant and married Frank Pollick who was widowed with two children, Albert and Louisa Pollick. Together Mary Blake and Frank Pollick hadtwo children, Madeline and Frank Pollick Sr. So the family consisted of Mary and Frank Pollick and the five children:hers,his and theirs. Frank Pollick came to Gloucester City from Italy. His Italian name was Lombardo. He changed his name to Pollick to fit in. Frank Pollick later left Mary Blake Pollick for a younger woman. She took in wash to support herself, and the kids. They lived on a farm in Gloucester, NJ, where the young Mary rode horses bareback. The farm was called Pollick's Farm. A local man wrote a poem about how nice Pollick's Farm was. It was printed in the Gloucester City News many times. The last time I saw the poem, I was around six years old. I'll try to find it.

Mary J. BlakeSr.died at age 50, March 1914. She was involved in a house fire. On her death bed she asked her daughter Madeline Pollick Andrews to look after her half sister Mary Blake. So Mary Blake always lived with Madeline and John Andrews at 328 Bergen St., Gloucester City, NJ until the sisters had a little disagreement over tripping over rugs. In 1967 or 1968 Mary Blake moved out and got an apartment on Hudson St. in Gloucester, NJ. Mary Blake Jr. died, August 1969. She never married. Madeline Pollick Andrews died in 1976 or 1977. John Andrews died around 1968. Frank PollickSr., March 17.1967.I don't know much about Albert Pollick. He had a son named Jack Pollick who married Edna? They lived in California. Jack would be about 83 years old. Jack had a sister named Helen. She lived in Ohio.Lousia Pollick married a man named Butler. They had a few children One daughter was Thelma Butler Geitz. Thelma's daughter married a man named Love.

Dear Brenda,

Oh my God. What a sad but beautiful entry and tribute to her mother that Viola wrote. Margaret must have been a wonderful mother to her children. And your grandmother, Viola was a deep woman with a value system to have written such an entry about her Mother Margaret, wife of Harry Stoy, mother of Marian, Viola, Blanche, Leon, Margaret, and Lillian. Such sensitivity. The Stoys are record keepers...

I have been trying to get the time to explain Marian's story to you, as I have related it to Ann and Bob. Amazingly, reading the diary entry entitled "Margaret Dies in this One", gives Marian's story relevance.

Here goes.

I was told Marian died, comitted suicide, by turning the gas stove on in the kitchen while her six week old daughter, Madeline Margaret Pollick lied in her bassinet and her five year old son, Frank PollickJr., was with her in the kitchen. This story was told to my mother, Madeline Pollick, Marian's daughter by Frank Pollick, Sr's two sisters who raised their sister-in-laws children, Frank and Madeline Pollick. Whan Marian was found in the kitchen, Frank, Jr. was lying next to his mother.

My mother was raised by Madeline and John Andrews and Mary Blake, Frank Pollick, Sr's sisters and brother-in-law. She grew up believing she was John and Madeline Pollick Andrews' child. She was told Frank Pollick, Sr was her uncle and Frank Pollick, Jr (who did not immediately join the home) was her cousin. Frank, Jr lived with his father for a while after his mother's death. Eventually Madeline Andrews took him in. My mother did not learn the truth until her pending marriage in 1947. There was no contact from the Stoy family until Jan. 1948 when Frank Pollick, Jr died in the army, was viewed at McCann's Funeral home in Gloucester City. At his viewing, two Stoy sisters came into the funeral home, paid their respects to Frank, Jr. but never approached my mother or Marian's sister-in-law who raised her children. My mother remembers one of them saying, "there she is.", referring to my mother.

Madeline Andrews and Mary Blake, Frank Pollick,Sr's sisters told this story: Marian supposedly eloped with Frank Pollick,Sr.by climbing out her bedroom window.Her father was not happy about her marrying Frank and disowned her. Marian and her mother were very close and remained close until Margaret's death just before my mom was born. (The disowning part is questionable in my mind due to the fact Marian and Frank lived on Crystal Lake Ave between Mary Stoy,Harry's mother, Marian's grandmother and Harry Stoy,Marian's father for a while, according to the 1920 census.) However, there could have been a falling out between Harry and Marian, at some point. Marian, Frank Sr, Frank,Jr,and Lillian wound up living on Somerset St. in Gloucester City, NJ. Margaret would visit with a kettle of beer. Marian loved her mother. Marian had a piano in this house and loved to play it. Here is where things begin to deterioate.Marian's daughter, Lillian died of Meningitis. I am not sure of dates,yet.Margaret,Marian's mother dies, Aug 03,1924, Marian gives birth to my mother Madeline on November 24,1924.Marian commits suiside,Jan10,1925. My mother was told in 1947, Marian suffered from post partum depression and a broken heart. Losing her four year old daughter to meningitis and her mother were all too much for her.(And now to find out Margaret died from cancer, how painful for Marian and all the children)

And Brenda, Viola had your Mom on Nov. 8,1924. So the two sisters were pregnant at the same time. Your mom and my mom were first cousins and could have had a relationship, had things been different. And poor Viola lost her mother just before giving birth, also. She probably wrote the diary entry

while pregnant with your mom.

I live ten miles/ten minutes from Crystal Lake Ave. in Haddonfield. Everytime I have had to drive through the area, I would feel uneasy, wanting to stop in the Historical Society building to research the family. Resposibilities always took precedence. I find it hard to believe I have found you three cousins and Marian. In my wildest dreams, I never imagined getting so close to everyone. Marian has always been a mystery to me, but someone I felt affection toward. I never judged her for what she did, just wanted to know her. It must have been so painful for her to lose a daughter and her mother. But through Viola's words and eyes we can see how sensitive they were and how much in Viola's words their Mother was loved. It is so wonderful that the diary was written and preserved all these years.

I still just can not believe we have found each other.

There was an article in the March 3, 1859 New Jersey Mirror newspaper about a man named Isaac Rogers in the employ of Joseph Stoy:

Headline: Sudden Death.

A young man named Isaac Rogers, sone of Joseph Rogers near Medford, was killed very suddenly on Thursday last. He was in the employ of Joseph Stoy, and was carting logs, and when near Milford, he attempted to jump from the front of the wagon, when his feet caught in the traces or swingle-trees, and he fell upon his head, breaking his neck. A man and a boy were not far off, with another team, and upon coming up to him, found him dead. He was about 21 years of age, and was a sober, industrious young man. Taking into consideration his uniformly temperate habits, the accident may be looked upon as one of those mysterious dispensations of Providence, which cannot be accounted for. In a state of the most perfect health, he was instantly summoned from Time to Eternity.

I thought it was a really cool article.

Now about the diary. It appears to be a diary that was first owned by Mary BStoy, MOTHER of Harry B. Stoy. Then, it appears to have been taken over by my grandmother Viola Stoy Wenner. There are two different handwritings in it. The inside cover appears to have a date of 1901 and my grandmother was born in 1901. The first part of the book is alot of religious writings. Then, the births of children, my mother included are in the book. The death of Margaret Stoy is written about. Then there are some addresses. I have to confess that I have not read the whole thing. I am going to scan it in....







Hey, very nice! I had been wondering how Marion Stoy fit into the family picture.

Now Harry P. Stoys wife, I have no last name. Gertrude is her middle name. I will try to write to NJ for their marriage Licence.

ALSO> Viola Mary Stoy never married Harry Brosius. He was her boyfriend. I mention him because he was a huge part of our lives for 30 years AFTER Viola died. We called him POP-POP even though he was never a blood relative. You may want to remove him if you want. Viola Divorced George Wenner and they both remarried.

Leon Stoy never married. He was not all there mentally.

Marguerite Stoy had a nickname, "Mocky." She was in and out of mental institutions. She later lived alone, never married and lived a very eccentric life. My brother, who is 15 years older than I, remembers her well. i have a photo of her. She kept money in Paper bags all over her house. When she ventured out, she would take a paper bag of money with her. She had a model a ford which she kept in a garage attached to her home. She polished it non-stop, even the undercarriage. Never took it out in the rain or snow. She later got a 1940 Ford and kept it the same way. My mother used to go check on her.

I will work on getting some of that other stuff documented. I have Viola's obit:

Obituary: Mrs. Viola M. Wenner, 59, died Wednesday at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Harris of Union Mill Road, Marlton. Surviving are two sons, George and Raymond, and two other daughters, Mrs. Viola Yetneck and Mrs. Doris Swindell all four of Florida; three sisters and fourteen grandchildren. Services will be held at 2pm at a funeral home at 74 East Main Street, Marlton where friends may call from 12pm to 2pm. Burial will be in Harleigh Cemetery.

I want to share something else with you. I am attaching a 1920 Census. It is of Crystal Lake Road in Haddonfield. On it is listed a bunch of my family members and yours too.

At the bottom, you will see Paul Wenner and his wife Anna with one of the children named George. George would later marry Viola Stoy, lower on the page. Next, Mary B. Stoy widow, Harry P. Stoys MOTHER.

THEN IT SAYS Frank A Stoy. Wife Margaret and Leon, Lillian, Marguerite and Viola. I THINK THE CENSUS TAKER ACCIDENTLY WROTE FRANK A, just as he did for the FRANK A POLLICK instead of writing HARRY P. THis is undoubtedly the Harry P. Stoy family, all the names and dates and even the address add up.

Can you comment.

Dear Brenda,

My name is Eileen Vitola. My mother is Madeline Stoy Pollick. She is the daughter of Marian Stoy Pollick, Harry P. Stoy's daughter, Aaron Stoy's granddaughter. Marian died 01-10-25, when my mother was six weeks old. Her mother, Marian Stoy Pollick committed suicide six weeks after the birth of her third child, my mother Madeline. The Stoy family did not have any contact with Marian's two living children after their mother"s death in 1925. They were raised by their paternal aunt, Madeline Pollick Andrews, Mrs. Andrew's husband, John Andrews and Mrs. Andrew's sister, Mary Blake. My mother had an older brother Frank, who had the only picture of their mother in his possession when he died in Japan in the line of duty in 1948, just after WWII. When the US Army returned Frank's body to the family (paternal Family), the only missing possession of Frank's was the only photo of his beloved mother Marian. My mother never saw her mother's face nor did she know Frank Stoy Pollick, Jr was her brother. She was told he was her cousin, as after Marian's death, she was raised by her paternal aunt. At his funeral, two Stoy sisters to Marian showed up to view Frank, Jr. My mother, age 24, remembers hearing the two sisters to Marian, aunts she never knew, say, "there she is". They never introduced themselves to her or their brother-in - law's sister who raised Marian's children after Marian died. The Stoy family had no contact with Marian's two living children. Marian had a child named Lillian who died of meningitis before the birth of my mother in November 24, 1924.

I so wish I could find a photo of Marian or family members for my mother.

Can you please contact me? Photos of Marian's sisters would be a gift and blessing. Sharing the diary would be a gift, as well. Talking to your brother would be awesome, as well. Your great uncle Leon and aunt Margaret are my mother's lost uncle and aunt. That makes you my mom's second cousin.

Amazingly, I was not aware, that in January my grandmother Marian and her son Frank died, however, that is the month my mother is uneasy and the month I am driven to wonder most about Marian, her family and my Stoy family roots.

I am impressed with how many Stoy descendants are driven to seek their ancestry. I think it is a genetic trait.

Looking forward to hearing from you, another family member.

She lived alone, my brother can tell us where, and had an old Model A Ford that she polished relentlessly. She never drove it in the rain and even polished the underside of the car. Later she got a 1940 Ford and kept it the same way. Somehow, She had money, lots of it. But she kept it in paper bags all over the house. When she did venture out in her car, she took a paper bag of money with her. She had a nickname, everyone called her "MOCKY." I do have a photo of her I will get to you.

Leon was also "not all there in the head." He never married either.

My grandmother Viola Mary Stoy was a vibrant, pretty woman who divorced my grandfather and went through a few boyfriend! She was a bit of a rebel for those times I would bet! ANYWAY, just wanted to tell you some more about the others in the family.

ANOTHER sister, Blanche Stoy, I have met. She used to live next door to us in Williamstown Junction New Jersey. She lived in a small house with a fence around the yard and she had geese. They would not let anyone in the yard!!! Her husband, Charles Woodfall had a severe stroke in his later years and was confined to a hospital bed right in their living room. I remember that creeping me out a little! He was paralyzed on his left side and could not speak or take care of himself. They never had children.

Dear Ann:

So glad to hear from you. I understand how busy you must be. I can't believe how busy my husband Carl and I are at this point in our lives. We had more free time years ago. I keep asking myself, am I moving slower or what??? I just don't have the stamina that I used to have. Our parents need us more now, as well. Carl is a family physician and I manage his office.

My mother went through her records, but had no documentation of the names of Marian's sisters who came to Frank Pollick Jr.'s funeral. Mom thinks Viola sounds familiar. Mom said she believes Marian's mother's maiden name was (Margariete) Gurt. After finding out Marian lived on Crystal Lake Ave. with her husband Frank Pollick, next door to her grandmother Mary and next door to her father Harry, it shed light on why her two sisters went to Frank Jr.'s funeral. The sisters may have had a relationship with little Frank while they lived on Crystal Lake Ave. My question remains why did the Stoys not stay in touch with Marian's children after her death? My version was that the Stoys disowned Marian for marrying Frank. But in my opinion that could not have be so in light of the fact that Marian and Frank were living between Marian's grandmother and father on Crystal Lake Ave. How they wound up on Ridgeway St. in Gloucester City, NJ is a mystery. Marian's mom, Margarite, supposedly visited Marian in Gloucester, but not Harry. Harry must have had a falling out. My mother's aunt, Madeline Andrews (Frank Pollick, Sr's sister) who raised Frank Jr. and my mother never legally changed my mother's name, thinking the Stoys would contact her. It never happened.

Family history has benefitted me.I have a similar situation within my immediate family.I am the aunt to two children who were astranged to us.I kept in touch, sent gifts equal to what all the other neices and nephews received, etc.My motivation, my great aunts that did not keep in touch with my mother and Frank, Jr. Those two kids are grown now and are part of our life, as well as their mother, my brother's former wife. Because of my nature, I probably would have keep connected to those kids anyway, but wishing those aunts had connected with Marian's kids motivated me even more.

I have no idea how to obtain information on Marian's death notice or how to find out where she is buried. We were told she was buried in Pennsylvania where her mother's people were from, (the Gurt family). I can explain how she died, as it was told to my mother. Marian committed suicide six weeks after giving birth to my mother. It was attributed to post partrum depression. Frank Jr. was about five. He was in the room where Marian died. Lillian, Marian's second child had recently died of meningitis. It was interesting to see Marian had a sister named Lillian. We do not know where Lillian is buried, as well. Little Frank Jr. witnessed it all. Marian's mother had recently died, also, which may have contributed to Marian's suicide.

When Frank, Jr died in Japan in 1948, his body was shipped back to the states in a coffin sealed with a glass lid. His cause of death was unknown. It has bothered my mother all these years why the glass lid and unknown cause of death. He survived the loss of his mother and sister, WWII, and was a nice boy, shy, carryiny the memories of his mother's death, etc... According to my aunts he had the only photo of Marian in his wallet, which did not return home from Japan with his remains. The missing photo of Marian sparked a glimmer of hope in my mother that maybe Frank was still alive... It has hurt her all these years that she grew up being told he was her cousin.

If you and Bob are coming to New Jersey, Carl and I would love to have you, Bob and your families as our guest for dinner. It would be so nice and just fun. Please contact us. We are only ten miles from Haddonfield.

We have had no time for genealogy, I really do not know the protocol, but we are extremely family oriented. I am willing to pay fees and expenses for manuscripts, etc. But mostly, it is nice just to have a relationship with family. It is just so nice to be connected. I am fascinated by the very fact that I have been motivated to seek my Stoy roots. Silly as it sounds, I am haunted by the fact that I do not know them. My mother and aunts inadvertently made me love people that were dead before I was born. And I truly love them. What amazes me is that I believe it may be a unique Stoy trait.

Again, please keep in touch and let me know when you are in the area. We would love to get together for dinner and to meet you.

Dear Eileen and Ann,

It turns out that I had Marian's family but not her and one of her sisters. I was able to locate her in the 1900 and 1910 census and found that Eileen's story provided clues to the mystery of the entries in the 1920 census.

Marian's father was Harry P Stoy, son of Aaron Stoy, son of James R Stoy and son of Phillip Stoy. Some of this is already on the web site at STOY was born between 1832 and 1841 in New Jersey (his birth date needs verification - he was 17 in 1850, 35 in 1870 and 39 in 1880 census data). His property also abutted Saddlertown, a community of African-Americans. Aaron, Mary and Harry, along with Aaron's brother James, appeared in Haddon Township during the 1880 census. He died on 11 Feb 1896. He was buried in Harleigh Cemetery, Camden, Camden Co, New Jersey.

STOY was born in Jul 1870 in New Jersey. He married Margaret [-?-] between 1891 and 1892 (based on 1900 census data). Harry, Margaret, Marion, Leon and Lillie lived in West Haddonfield, Camden Co, New Jersey during the 1900 census - no occupations were listed for any of the family. Another unnamed child had died between 1900 and 1910. Frank A Stoy is listed as age 50, the age of Harry. Harry also appeared in the 1930 census so clearly he was alive in 1920, so I'll assume that Harry is head of household in the 1920 census but the death records need to be searched. "Harry" is a farmer and Frank is listed as a shipyard worker. Harry was a widower at the time of the 1930 census and he lived with his son and two daughters in Haddon Township at the time. There is no information yet on his death date.

STOY was born in Sep 1895 in Pennsylvania. She married Frank A POLLICK.

STOY was born in Apr 1896 in New Jersey (the 1930 census has a date about 5 years later). Leon is a farm worker, probably on his father's farm, during the 1920 census.

STOY was born in Mar 1899 in New Jersey. Lillian is a worker in a staple factory during the 1920 census.

STOY was born between 1900 and 1901 in New Jersey. Viola is a worker in a staple factory, along with her sister Lillian, during the 1920 census.

STOY was born between 1901 and 1904 in New Jersey.

f) STOY was born between 1903 and 1906 in New Jersey

One interesting item that comes out of the 1920 census is the following:

Mary, wife of Aaron Stoy, was widowed and living alone at 250 Crystal Lake Avenue, Haddon Township, Camden County during the 1920 census, and she owned the property. Also, I've done no further research on what happened to the various children of Harry, whether they married, where they lived and when they died. I think the credit goes to Eileen for providing the clues needed to straighten out this part of the family and provide a family story that is worth preserving.

Eileen, would the names of the two Stoy women who attended Frank Jr's funeral possibly be Lillian or Viola or Marguerite?

Ann, the person named Marion M Pierce was the adopted daughter of James and Estelle Stoy (Pierce is her birth parent's name). I've been in touch with her son to try to straighten out the story of James, which I need to dig into further with NJ records.

Hi Ann,

I am so glad to hear from you this morning. I believe my grandmother, Marian Stoy, may be your great grandfather, Charles Stoy's sister, one of James and Margaret's seven. I have been told that Marian Stoy's mother's name was Margaret, nee, Gert, and that MargaretGert was originally from Germantown, and her family owned a bakery. Marian Stoy, I was told climbed out her bedroom window to elope with an employee of her father's, named Frank Pollick. Her father supposedly disowned her for this. She and Frank lived on Ridgeway St. in Gloucester City, NJ where she died, six weeks after giving birth to her third child, Madeline Pollick, my mother. Marian's second child, Lillian Pollick had recently died of meningitis and Marian had also recently lost her mother, Margaret Gert Stoy who did visit Marian, despite the fact her father disowned her. There is sadness surrounding this Marian Stoy. My mother never knew her mother, Marian Stoy. Marian left behind her 6 week old daughter, my mother, and a son, Frank, Jr., about 5 years old. My mother was raised by her paternal aunts as their own, never knowing her Stoy roots or that her brother, Frank was her brother. Marian's family sadly had no contact with Marian's two children. My mother was told the truth only before she married in 1947. The only brief encounter my mother ever had with any Stoys took place around 1948 when two Stoy sisters to Marian came to the McCann's Funeral Home in Gloucester City to view Marian's son, Frank Pollick, Jr. my mother's brother. Marian's son, Frank Pollick, Jr. served in the army through the entire WWII. When the war ended, Frank reenlisted and was stationed in Japan. He died in Japan under mysterious circumstances. In his wallet he carried the only photograph of his mother Marian. My mother never saw her mother's photo. When Frank's body was sent home to McCann's Funeral Home the only item missing from his processions was the one and only picture of his beloved mother, Marion Stoy Pollick.Remember, he was 5 years when his mother, Marian died, He witnessed a tragey. He never spoke of it and my mother thought he was her cousin because after Marian's death, he remained with his father, Frank Pollick, Sr for a period. When Frank was brought into my mother's childhood home it was under the pretense that he was a cousin, not her brother, all the while my mother believed her paternal aunt & uncle were her parents, that her biological father, Frank Pollick was her uncle. All of this oral information has been passed on to me by my mother Madeline whose two paternal aunts passed it on to her before her own marriage. I don't know how accurate it is. But we love a women we never knew. We think about Marian often. I would love for my 79 year old mother to see a photograph of her mother or perhaps any of the Stoy family. We were told Marian was buried in a cemetery in Germantown, with Margaret Gert Stoy or the Gert family.
