NOW HERE'S A SAD STORY.

Fannie Weber La Sorry That She Ever Met Walter & Stoy, of Camden.

Walter 8. Stoy, secretary of the Camden County Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animale, and the son of a wealthy farmer living near Westmont, N. J., was held in \$1000 bail by Justice Schmitz at Camden yesterday afternoon for a further hearing to-morrow morning on the charge of seduction. A civil suit for breach of promise is also likely to follow.

The complainant is Miss Fanny Wober, a seventeen-year-old daughter of Joseph Weber, living at Tonth and Carpenter streets. Camden, who is vigorously prosecuting the case.

The fair plaintiff avers that Stoy betrayed her last November when he took hersoil and her sister out in the country for a carriago ride. He had frequently called upon her, and on the date in question he invited ber and her sister to take a carriagoride into the country. The two girls became separated, when Miss Fannie avers that Stoy made improper proposals to her, and finally accomplished her betrayal. Btoy declares, however, that the whole scheme is an attempt at blackmail. L. W. Goldy went his security for a further bearing.

The defendant is about twenty-seven years old, and has heretofore borne a good. reputation. He is actively interested in the organization of an Episcopal Church at Collingswood, and is one of the most prominent members. The case has created quite

a sonsation in Camden and vicinity.

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
