Notes taken by Mrs & Mrs Haydock, Sr.
on conversation with Mr Walter
Stoy in 1945

House 523-525 Coker Landing Road

Mr Stoy circa 1909 made over.

picture - Haddon Herald Weekly 1-10-1952

and article reflecting Samuel Rhoads's
research of circa 1875 that this was
site of Sig. Haddon's first home in 1701.

Walter Stoy stated that in the walls
was a portion of ^{an} the original log cabin.

"James Stoy - grandfather of Walter Stoy
was born _____.

this is not

Coker Ldg Rd

He built his home on the brow of the
hill overlooking Cooper's Creek on the
south side of Coker Landing Road
about a quarter of a mile west of
Crown St. in the early 1800's,

probably before 1825. He later sold
it to his brother Samuel R Stoy who
sold it in turn to Jacob Heitz. It
is now ¹⁹⁴⁸ owned by Samuel De Fabio
who operates a riding academy. The
house itself is in bad state of repair
but shows the good lines of the period."

The present dam is where road runs from Haddon Ave to Rhoads Ave Hinckman Homestead and the flax mill was on the east side by the road at Carlton W. the dam near the stoy homestead. Plaster mill Elm Ave at the Tennessee Court was operated by the south branch of Newton Creek. Saw mill on west side of Crystal Lake operated by Stoy

Apple orchard on hill above the lake Rhoads Ave in back from 4th Lake Stoy mill road runs from Stoy Sq. Crystal Lake Ave in Stoy Rd from westward to H.H. in from this runs Rhoads Ave. Chas. Rhoads had a slave whom he established in Saddlestown on Rhoads Av. and this has been a self respecting colored settlement ever since

A lane runs past the flax mill and over the present dam went up over the hill past an apple orchard west of Crystal Lake and past a home built by one of Stoy sons and met the H.H. Rd near 4th Lake Ave. The Hinckman homestead now a tap room

Stays ldy west side of Grove St Haddonfield side of Cooper Creek. Philip Stays store & warehouse stood opposite side of Cole's ldy Rd opposite the stay wharf. No buildings since the 1820's show activity as late as July 19, 1845

on the east side of Grove St along the creek was another wharf & more storage blage

Mallettas - the low part with chimney was original home built by Philip Stoydja

Ralph Cooper's distillery on Whiskey Rd (now Chapel Rd) Ralph Cooper Farm

all roads led to the factory. 1889 TCB

Cherry Hill above 2d circle. Mrs Douglas sister (?)

Cole's Ave runs from Norton Pike Erlton to Maple Lodge crossing Whiskey Rd. no reason to start at Pike - business was at wharf.

Wilmer Collins Farm

Landings

First landing on Cooper Creek bet Camden & Hdld was E.H's. second ldy was Stays at Grove St. Uppermost ldy for Canal boats was Cooperstown Ldy.

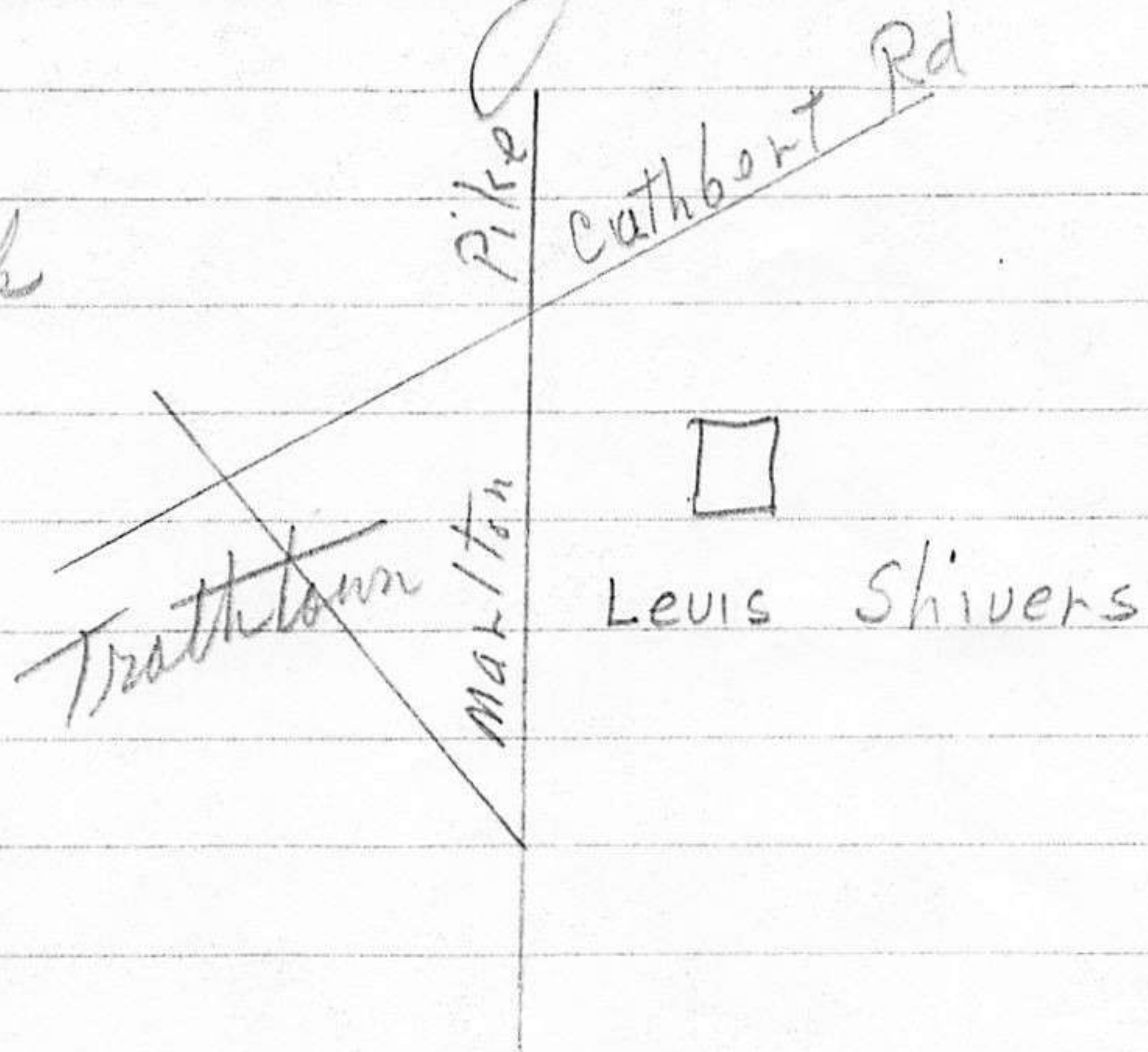
