1850 Died at Bluff Point Westmoreland County on Sunday night the 21st of April, ¹⁸⁵⁰ Robert H. Montgomery in the 35th year of his age, leaving wife and one Daughter to mourn his loss. Died on Sunday Evening about half past three o'clock

1851 February the 9th 1851 Mrs Sarah B. Montgomery ^{widow} ~~wife of the~~ above, at Bluff Point Westmoreland County, aged 30 years and five days, leaving two Children, a daughter about 5 years old, and Infant son about six weeks old, and a Father, and Mother, three brothers, and three sisters, to mourn her loss

Died at Willow Hill, ^{King George County} Thursday Evening about seven o'clock April the 10th 1851 Mrs. Frances B. Arnold aged about 59 years before her Death she chose the Text for her Funeral sermon which was in the 19th Chapter and 25th Verse of the Book of Job, and the Hymn to sing which was the 195th of the Virginia selection, beginning with these words, How solemn the signal I hear, also the Minister she wished to preach it, and for it to be preached before she was interred, all of which was done. Thus she has left a beloved Husband John Arnold, six children and five grandchildren, one sister, one half sister and many friends to lament her loss, but they sorrow not as those that have no hope, for all who knew her believe she has left this world of sorrow for one of joy and happiness.

DR. THOMAS THORNTON ARNOLD.

DR. THOMAS THORNTON ARNOLD, one of the most prominent and beloved citizens of King George County, died at "Willow Hill," his ancestral home, April 25, 1917, after a useful life of almost eighty-two years, most of it spent in the service of his Master, whom he adored. Dr. Arnold was in many ways a remarkable man, retaining his youth and activity to the time of his death. Cultured, genial, affable, he and his good wife diffused a charming hospitality that made their home always a delight to the entire community. All claimed him as their friend, and he never disappointed them. Of fine conversational powers and extended knowledge, to be with him was a pleasure and privilege, lifting one to a higher atmosphere, inspiring to nobler living. As a counsellor and guide he could always be depended on. He delighted to do good, and his many generous deeds sent sunshine and comfort to saddened hearts and homes. We all loved and honored him and his place cannot be filled. Dr. Arnold was a prominent member of St. John's church, a vestryman and leader in all pertaining to the cause of religion. A loyal Christian soldier, he fought life's battles with courage undaunted, and came off grandly victorious. Death was only the gateway into a fuller, more blessed life for him.
